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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This consolidated annual report presents an integrated analysis of job market trends in Kenya across four consecutive quarters, capturing sectoral recruitment patterns, occupational demand, and evolving skill requirements. Drawing from advertised vacancies, the findings paint a clear picture of a labour market that is increasingly service-driven and skills-intensive.

Sectoral Dynamics

Across the year, job creation was consistently dominated by Public Administration; Education; Financial and Insurance Activities; Administrative & Support Services; Human Health & Social Work; and Information & Communication. Public Administration exhibited the strongest spikes particularly in Q1 and Q2, largely driven by government-led recruitment cycles. Education demand surged in Q3 and Q4, reflecting teacher recruitment programmes and institutional expansion. Finance, ICT, and healthcare maintained steady growth throughout the year, signaling ongoing digitization, financial deepening, and investments in health systems.

Conversely, sectors such as Agriculture, Construction, Mining, and Arts & Entertainment recorded minimal advertised vacancies across all quarters, highlighting limited formal-sector expansion and a continued reliance on informal recruitment channels within these industries.

Occupational Demand

Across the four quarters, Professionals accounted for the dominant share of vacancies frequently above 40% and reaching as high as 80% in quarter two. These included accountants, finance professionals, ICT specialists, engineers, medical practitioners, and business administration roles. Legislators, Administrators, and Managers remained consistently strong, underscoring high demand for leadership, governance, and executive oversight within both public and private institutions.

Technicians and Associate Professionals ranked third or second across all quarters, reflecting the need for mid-level technical roles that support professional and

managerial functions. Clerical and secretarial roles maintained steady demand, particularly in customer service, office support, and administrative functions. Across the year, low-skilled occupations accounted for less than 1% of all advertised vacancies, indicating continued informal recruitment processes for low skilled roles.

Skill-Level Trends

The labour market consistently favored high-skilled roles, which represented between 80–90% of all vacancies throughout the year. Middle-skilled roles constituted 8–15%, driven by clerical work, customer-facing roles, logistics, and basic ICT support. Low-skilled labour demand remained negligible.

These trends highlight the economy's shift toward specialized, knowledge-based work, the growing importance of digital and analytical competencies, and the need for continuous upskilling to enhance employability.

1.0 INTRODUCTION

Unemployment remains one of the most pressing socio-economic challenges in Kenya, particularly among the youth. According to the Kenya National Bureau of Statistics (KNBS), the unemployment rate stood at around 5.7% in 2023, with young people aged 15–34 years being the most affected. The high number of job seekers entering the labour market each year outpaces the available job opportunities, leading to increased joblessness. Additionally, many employed individuals remain in vulnerable or informal jobs that offer little security or growth potential.

A significant factor contributing to unemployment is the mismatch between labour market demands and the skills possessed by job seekers. The International Labour Organization (ILO) highlights that many young graduates globally, including in Kenya, struggle to secure meaningful employment due to a lack of industry-relevant skills. Rapid technological advancements and automation have also displaced low-skilled workers, further limiting opportunities in traditionally labor-intensive sectors.

To address these challenges, reliable and timely labour market information is essential. By providing insights into hiring trends, emerging occupations, and skill demands, this report aims to support evidence-based decision-making for policymakers, training institutions, job seekers, and employers. This analysis of job vacancies in Kenya for the period October to December 2024 will help bridge information gaps, align education and training programs with market needs, and facilitate more effective workforce planning.

2.0 SCOPE

This report covers an analysis of job listings in Kenya between July 2024 – June 2025 focusing on the most in-demand occupations based on the number of advertised vacancies across various sectors. Additionally, it highlights occupations with the highest number of vacancies by major occupational groups and skill levels, providing insights into labour market trends and demand patterns.

3.0 METHODOLOGY

This study follows a structured methodology, which includes data scraping, cleaning, analysis, and reporting. The data was scraped from various job portals in Kenya, using web crawling

techniques. These allowed for the automated extraction of job postings, including job titles, industry sectors, and number of vacancies.

After scraping, Occupations were coded and classified using the Kenya Standard Classification of Occupations (KeSCO), and industries/economic activities were classified using the Kenya Standard Industrial Classification of All Economic Activities (KeSIC). These classifications facilitate standardization of data for easy analysis. After coding of occupations and industries, a syntax code in Stata was used to clean the raw data and remove duplicates to correct inconsistencies. Tables were then generated to identify the most sought occupations and sectors with the highest number of vacancies. Data visualizations such as graphs were created to present the findings in a clear and understandable format.

4.0 FINDINGS

This section presents a detailed analysis of job vacancies advertised in Kenya between July 2024 – June 2025. The findings are categorized into three main areas: job vacancies by sector, job vacancies by major occupational group, and job vacancies by skill level. This structured approach provides a clearer understanding of labour market trends, including which sectors are driving employment, the most in-demand occupations, and the distribution of job opportunities across different skill levels.

4.1 Quarter 1

4.1.1 NUMBER OF JOB VACANCIES ADVERTISED BY SECTOR

This analyzes Job demand across various sectors, highlighting the industries with the most vacancies and the economic or policy factors influencing this demand. It will also discuss sectors with low job openings and potential reasons behind their slow growth. The analysis will provide insights into the stability and expansion potential of different industries in Kenya.

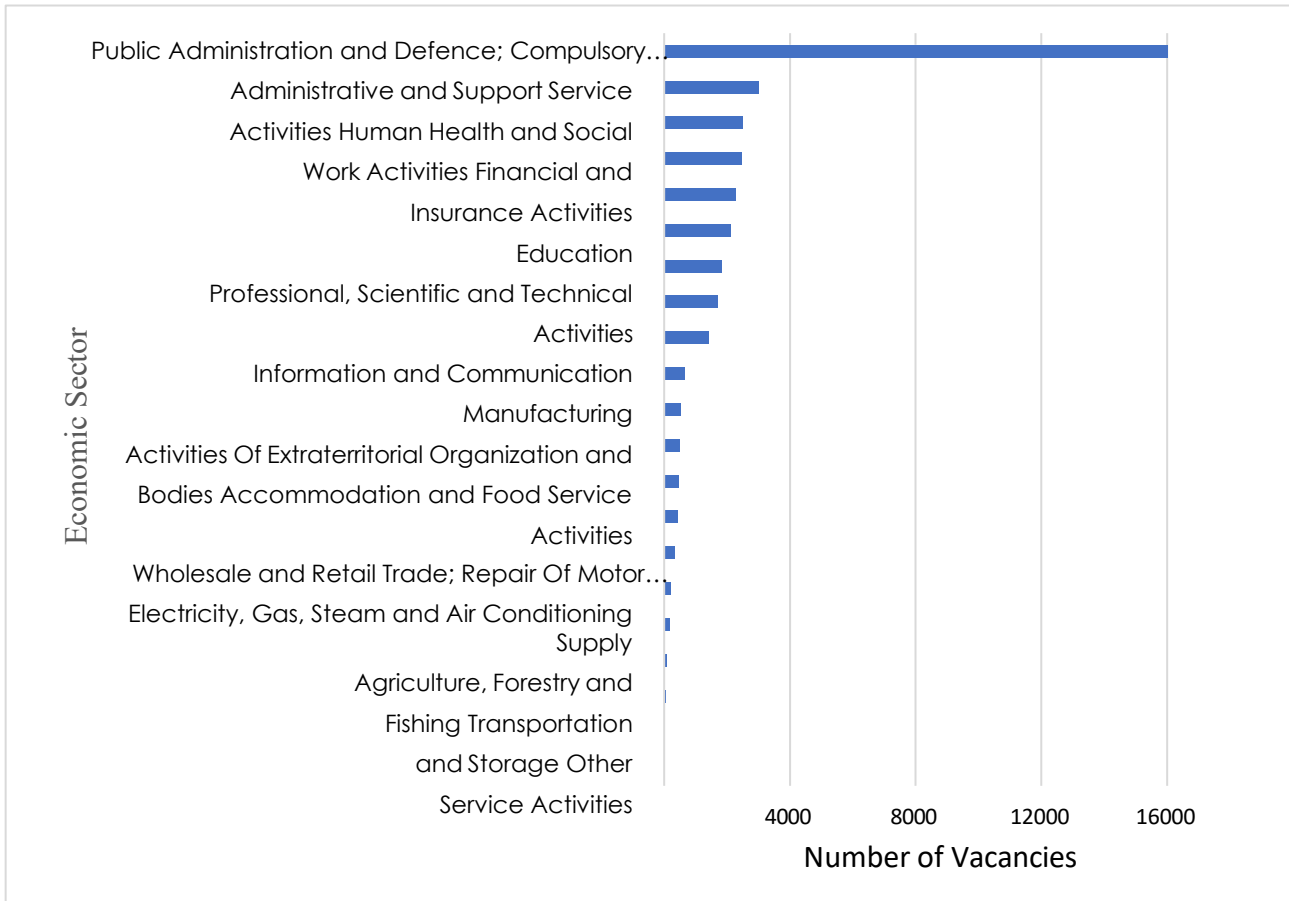


Figure 1: Number of Vacancies by Broad Sector

For the period July – September 2024, there were a significant number of job openings in the Public Administration and Defense sector, which accounted for 43.6% of all advertised positions, suggesting strong government-led recruitment. The Administrative and Support Services sector followed at 8.2%, indicating sustained demand for human resource support, clerical work, and auxiliary services. Healthcare (6.8%) and Financial and Insurance Activities (6.7%) showed notable demand, reflecting continued investment in essential services and financial sector resilience. The education sector (6.2%) also maintained a steady flow of opportunities likely to government reforms including the adoption of competence-based curriculum that needed expansion of schools to accommodate junior secondary schools that previously didn't exist. On the lower end, sectors such as Arts, Entertainment and Recreation (0.1%) and Mining and Quarrying (0.1%) had the least number of vacancies, indicating minimal expansion in these industries.

Implication:

- **Jobseekers:** Should prioritize careers in government, finance, healthcare, and education while also considering Administrative Support roles. Digital and analytical skills will be crucial, especially in finance and IT-related sectors.
- **Training Institutions:** Must align curriculum with high-demand sectors, emphasizing public service administration, finance, healthcare, and digital skills training.
- **Policy Makers:** Should invest in policies that support emerging sectors such as ICT and Manufacturing while sustaining growth in healthcare and finance.

4.1.2 NUMBER OF JOB VACANCIES ADVERTISED BY MAJOR OCCUPATIONAL GROUPS

This section breaks down job opportunities by broad occupational categories, such as clerical roles, professional and technical occupations. It will examine which occupational groups are experiencing the highest demand and explore possible reasons, including industry growth & economic shifts.

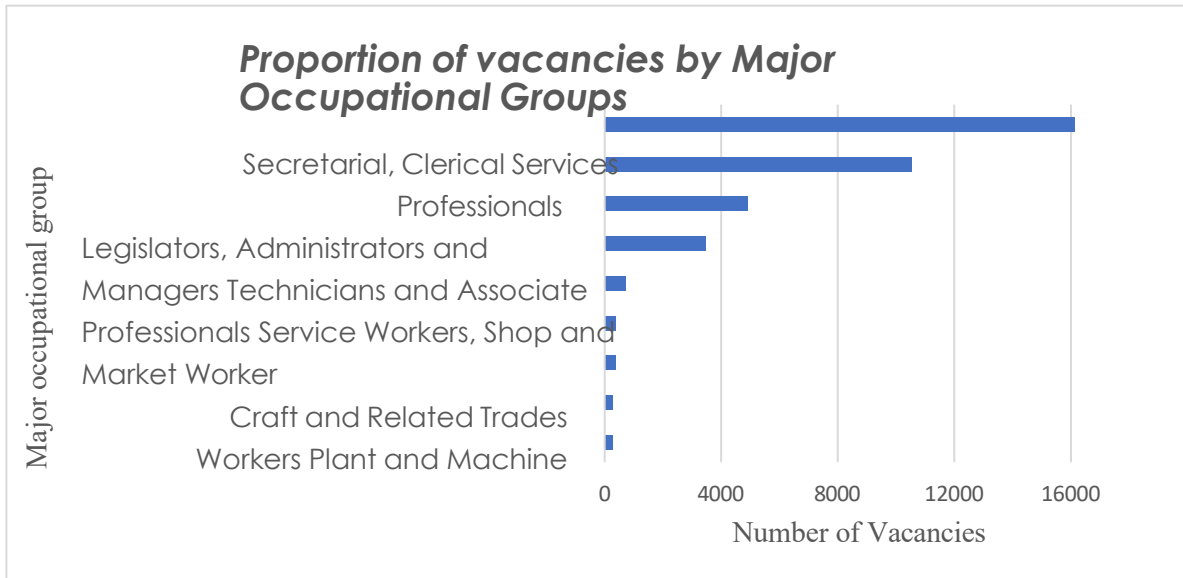


Figure 2: Proportion of Major Occupational Groups as per the Number of Vacancies

Secretarial and Clerical Services roles made up the largest share of job openings at 43.4%, reinforcing the need for administrative personnel across multiple industries. Professionals, including finance, IT, healthcare, and engineering roles, accounted for 28.4% of advertised jobs, showing that specialized knowledge and expertise remain key drivers of employment.

The relatively smaller proportion of vacancies for Elementary Occupations (0.8%) and Skilled Agricultural roles (0.8%) suggests a shrinking demand for low-skill jobs, likely due to technological advancements and mechanization.

CAVEAT: Most elementary jobs do not make it to job listings sites (Most times these roles are sought informally)

Implication:

- **Jobseekers:** Must enhance their professional qualifications, administrative, technical, and specialized roles to secure employment.

- **Training Institutions:** Should place greater emphasis on technical and professional courses, including business administration, IT, and engineering, to meet Kenya labor market demands.
- **Policy Makers:** Need to address skills gaps by promoting vocational training and upskilling programs to support the transition of workers into middle and high-skill occupations

4.1.3 NUMBER OF VACANCIES BY OCCUPATION AND SKILL LEVEL

This section will show the most demanded occupations by skill level according to the number of job vacancies advertised. The skill levels will be categorized into highly skilled, middle-skilled, and low-skilled roles. Among highly skilled occupations, Business Services and Administration Managers led with 2,040 vacancies, followed by Finance Professionals (1,731) and Software Developers (1,218). The high demand for managerial and finance roles indicates that strategic leadership and financial expertise remain core requirements in Kenya's labor market. IT-related roles, including Software Development and Database Management, highlight the increasing integration of technology across industries.

Implication:

- **Jobseekers:** Should prioritize leadership, financial management, and digital skills to remain competitive.
- **Training Institutions:** Must enhance business, finance, and IT programs, integrating emerging technologies such as data analytics.
- **Policy Makers:** Should promote investments in digital economy policies and leadership training to address skills shortages in management and IT sectors.

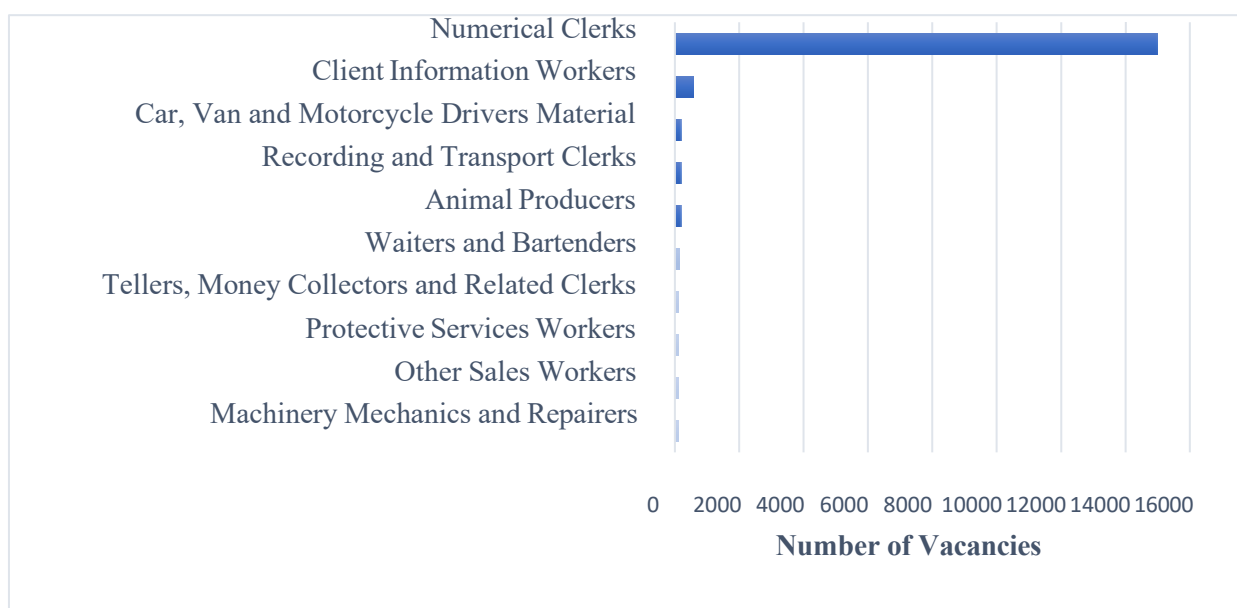


Figure 4: Top 10 Most Sought Occupations for Middle Skilled

Numerical Clerks (15,001) dominated this category, reflecting a high demand for accounting, record-keeping, and administrative work. Other roles, including Client Information Workers (585) and Drivers (200), also saw reasonable demand. The strong presence of clerical and administrative functions points to the ongoing need for efficient business operations and customer support services.

Implications;

- **Jobseekers:** Focus on developing clerical and business operations skills, including proficiency in data entry, customer service, and record management.
- **Training Institutions:** Must ensure that business administration courses include practical training in accounting software and office management.
- **Policy Makers:** Should support SMEs in hiring clerical staff by offering incentives for business expansion and capacity building.

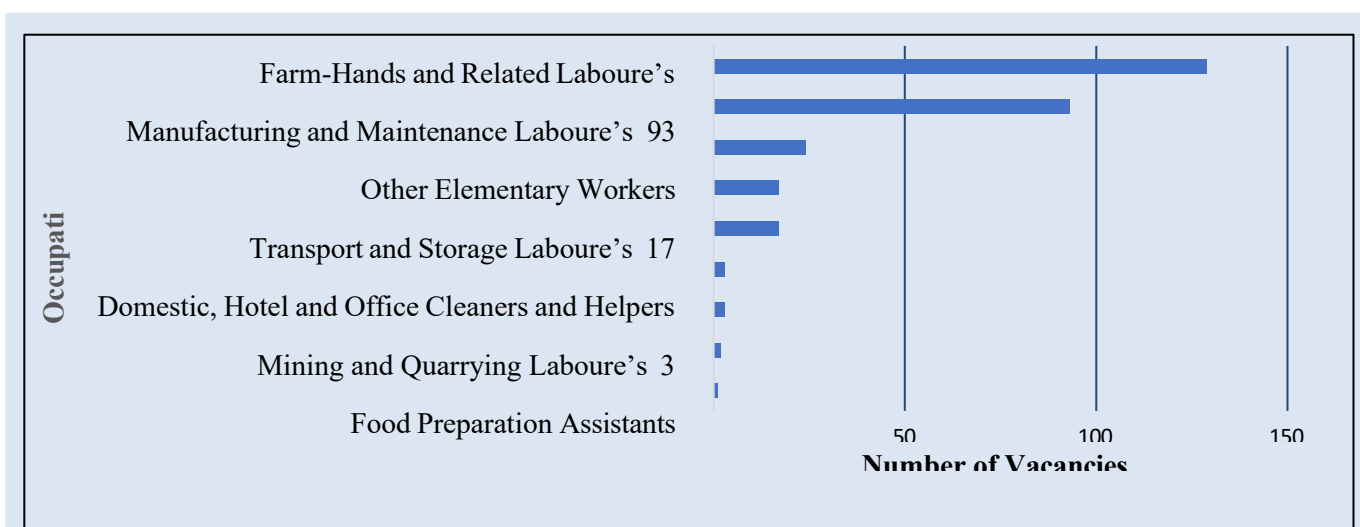


Figure 5: Top 10 Most Sought Occupations for Low Skilled

Farm Hands (129) and Manufacturing Laborers (93) had the highest demand, but overall, job openings for low-skilled workers were scarce. This trend suggests that automation, mechanization, and modernization are reducing the need for manual labor.

CAVEAT; Most Manual Jobs are not mostly sought through online channels (mostly through informal channels)

Implication:

- **Jobseekers:** Must upskill and transition into semi-skilled or skilled roles to increase employability.
- **Training Institutions:** Need to focus on vocational training to help workers move from low-wage jobs to higher-paying technical positions.
- **Policy Makers:** Should invest in reskilling programs and promote technology adoption in ways that create new employment opportunities rather than displacing workers.

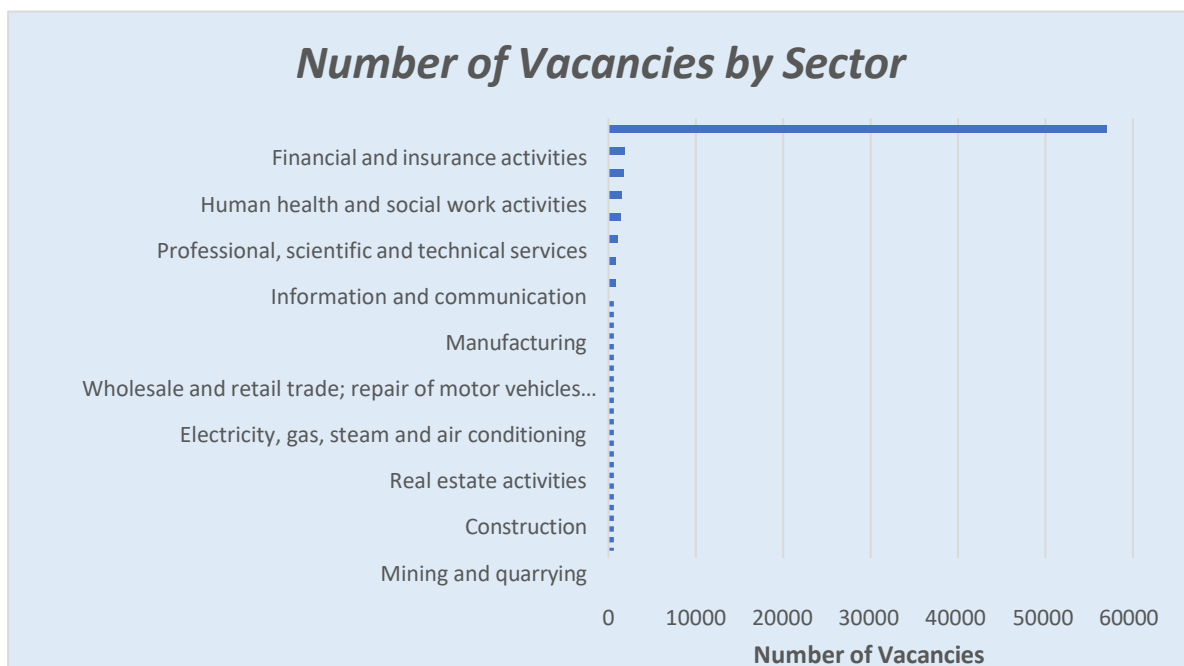


Figure 6: Number of Vacancies by Sector

The Public Administration and Defense sector accounted for an overwhelming **82.3%** of total job vacancies, indicating significant government hiring during the period. This could be linked to administrative expansions, policy-driven employment, or increased public service delivery. Financial and Insurance Activities followed at **2.7%**, driven by the sector's stability and digital financial

service expansion. Healthcare, Education, and Administrative Support Services contributed modestly, together making up **6.7%** of job postings.

Meanwhile, sectors like Mining & Quarrying (**0.0%**) and Construction (**0.1%**) saw minimal hiring, signaling slow investment or reduced economic activities in these industries.

Implication:

- **Jobseekers:** Should consider government positions, particularly in administration, security, and public service delivery. Finance and healthcare roles also present strong opportunities.
- **Training Institutions:** Should focus on courses relevant to public administration, financial management, and healthcare to match labor market demand.
- **Policy Makers:** Need to assess reliance on government hiring and explore policies to stimulate private-sector job creation in underrepresented industries.

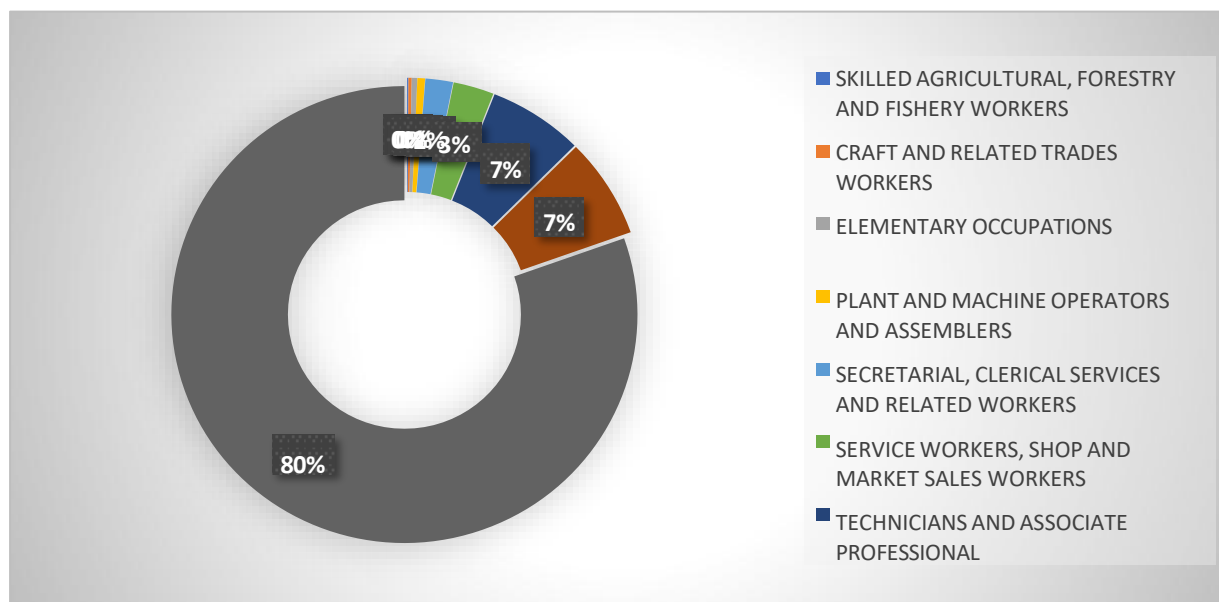


Figure 7: Proportion of Vacancies by Major Occupational Group

Professionals constituted the majority of job vacancies (**80.4%**), reflecting a demand for highly skilled expertise, particularly in teaching, healthcare, and financial services. Legislative, administrative, and managerial roles accounted for **7.1%**, underscoring leadership needs. Technicians and Associate Professionals followed at **6.6%**, with moderate demand for support-level technical roles. Low-skill occupations, including Elementary and Craft Trades roles, remained marginal, collectively accounting for under **1%** of vacancies, reinforcing the decreasing demand for unskilled labor due to automation and industrial changes.

Implication:

- **Jobseekers:** Should pursue higher education or specialized training to compete in the professional job market.
- **Training Institutions:** Need to enhance technical and professional skill training, focusing on managerial, healthcare, and educational roles.
- **Policy Makers:** Should invest in vocational education and create

strategies for transitioning low-skilled workers into semi-skilled or skilled positions.

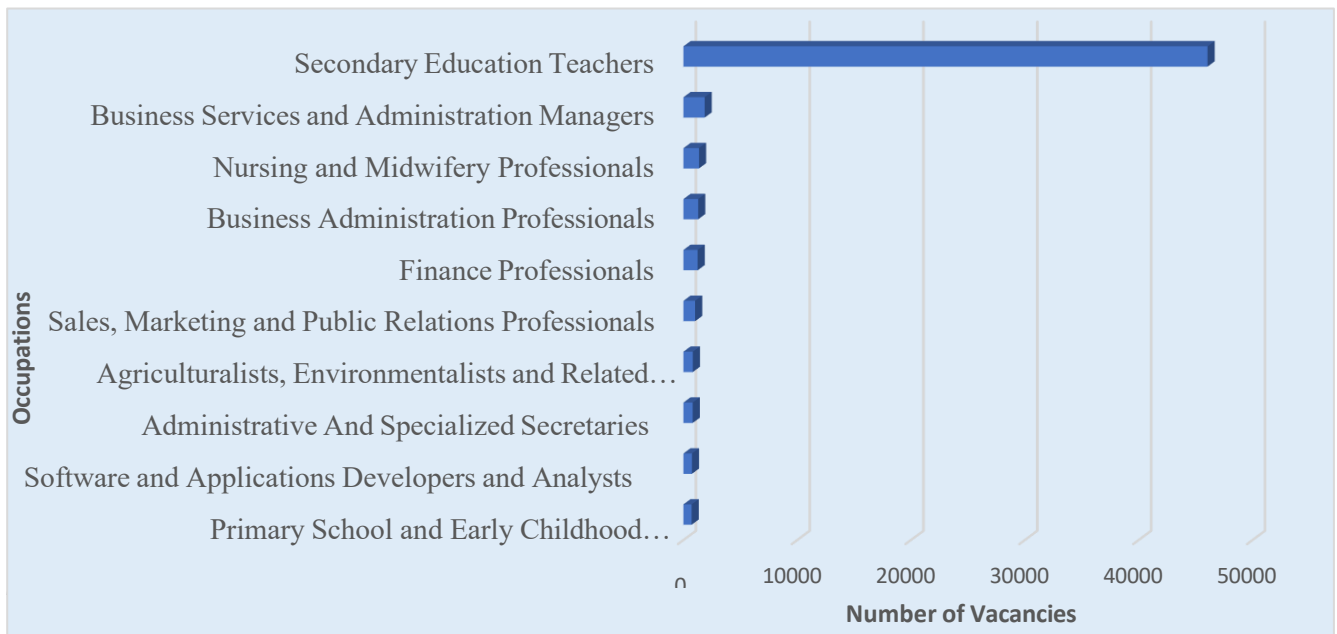


Figure 9: Top 10 Most Sought Occupations by number of vacancies For Highly skilled

Secondary Education Teachers dominated this category with **46,047** vacancies, emphasizing the government's continued investment in education. Other high-demand roles included Business Administration Managers (**1,862**), Nursing and Midwifery Professionals (**1,363**), and Finance Professionals (**1,246**), reflecting key national priorities.

Implications:

- **Jobseekers:** Should focus on obtaining relevant qualifications in education, healthcare, and finance for better employability.
- **Training Institutions:** Must expand programs in business management, finance, and healthcare to meet market demands.
- **Policy Makers:** Should allocate resources to support training institutions in producing a workforce aligned with high-demand occupations.

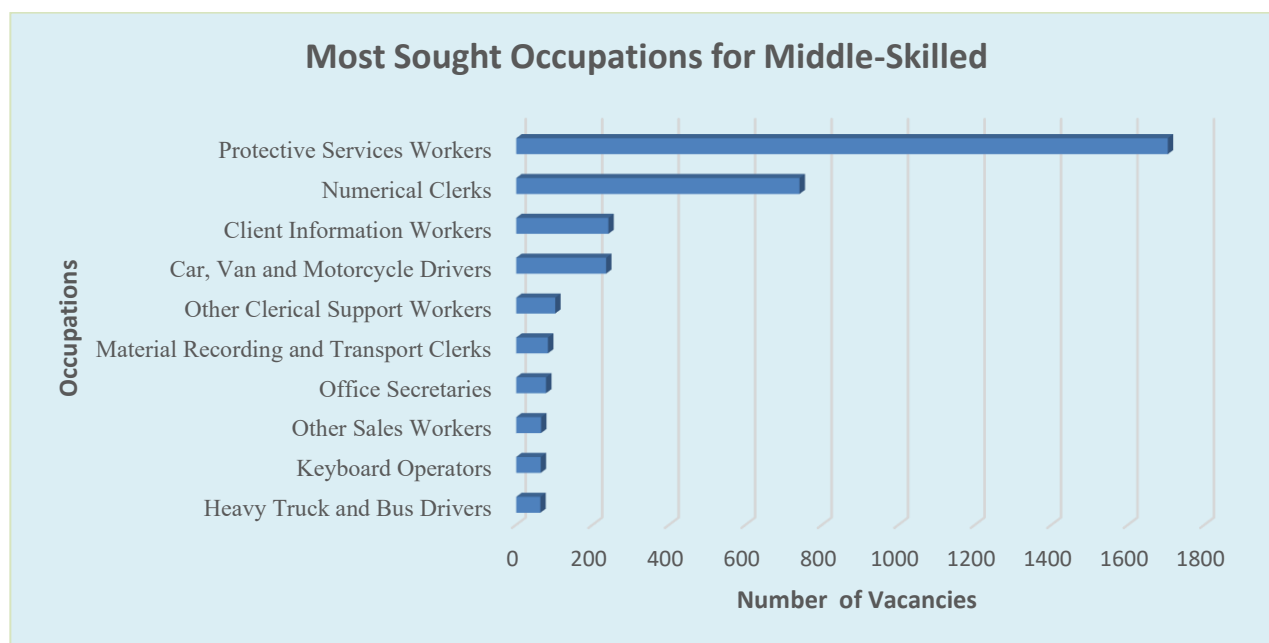


Figure 9: Top 10 Most Sought Occupations for Middle-Skilled

Protective Service Workers (e.g. police and security officers) led this category with **1,704** vacancies, signaling increased hiring in security. Clerical and administrative roles also had steady demand, including Numerical Clerks (**741**) and Client Information Workers (**241**).

Implication:

- **Jobseekers:** Should consider clerical, security, and transport-related roles for stable employment opportunities.
- **Training Institutions:** Must ensure clerical and administrative training includes modern office technology skills.
- **Policy Makers:** Should enhance workforce readiness programs for middle-skill workers to support administrative sectors.

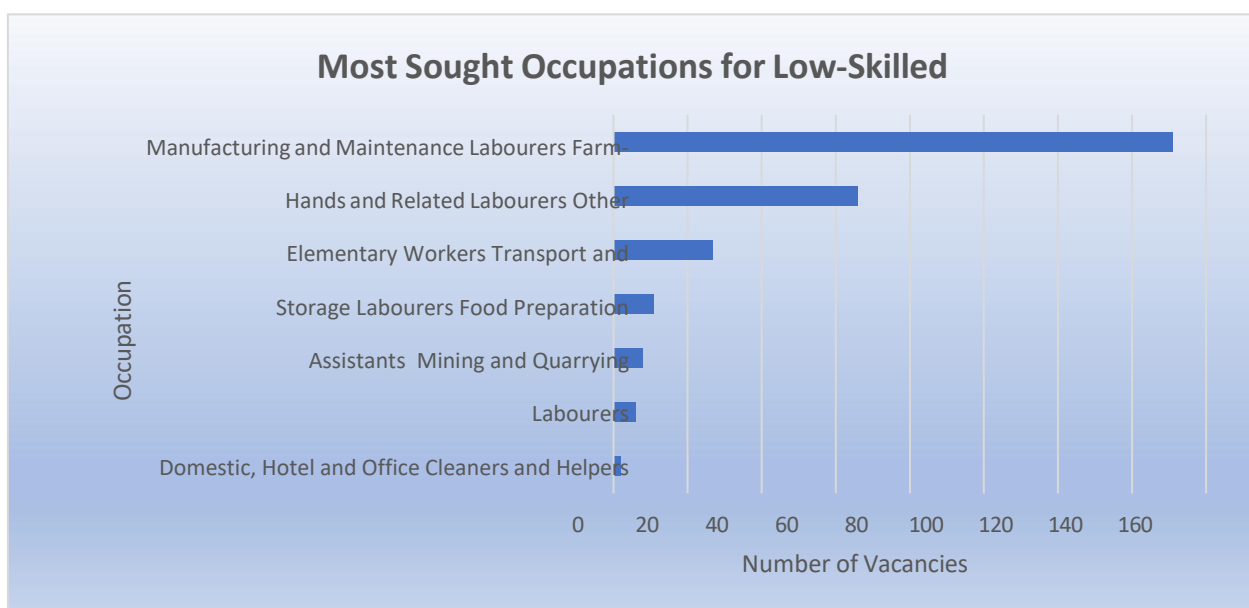


Figure 10: Most Sought Occupations for Low-Skilled

Manufacturing and Maintenance Laborers (**151**) had the highest demand among low-skilled roles, but overall, this category saw minimal vacancies, reinforcing the declining need for unskilled labour.

Implication:

- **Jobseekers:** Must focus on upskilling to transition into middle-skill or technical occupations.
- **Training Institutions:** Should emphasize short-term vocational courses to help low-skilled workers enter technical fields.
- **Policy Makers:** Must implement reskilling programs and support labor-intensive industries to sustain employment opportunities.

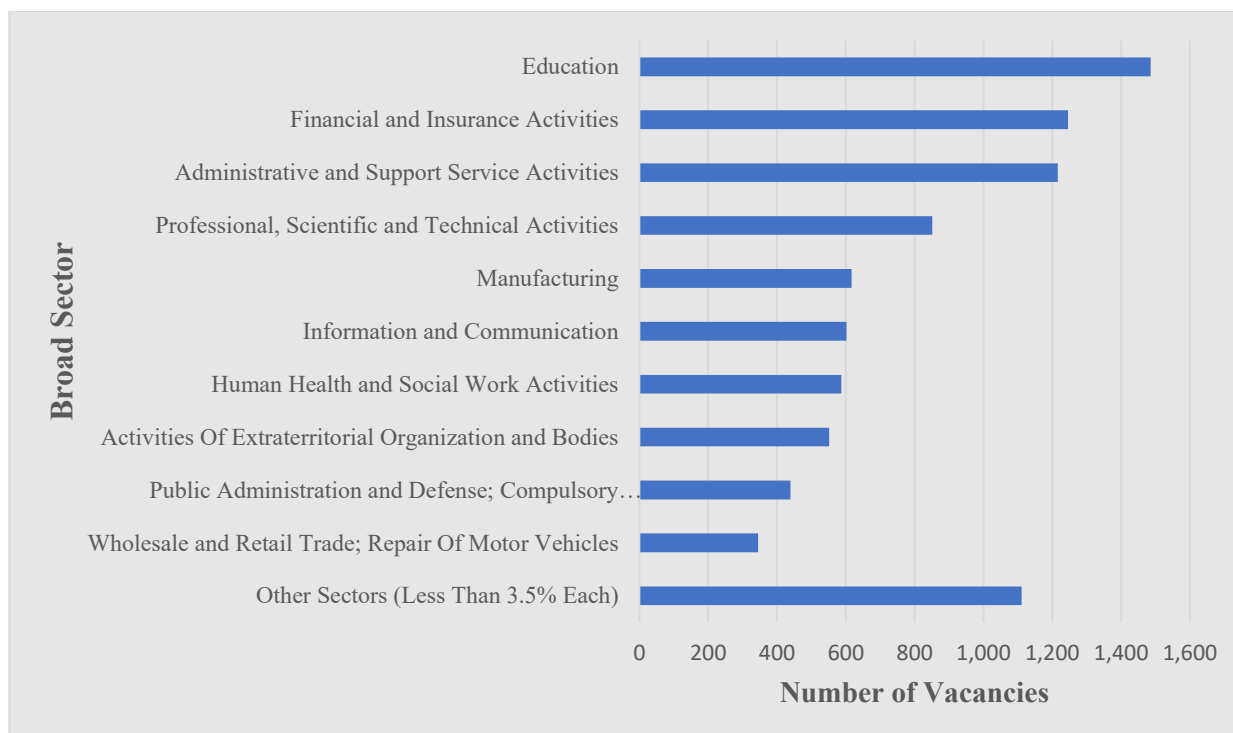


Figure 11: Number of Vacancies by Broad Economic Sector

The Education sector was the largest source of employment opportunities, with 1,486 vacancies (16.0%). This was closely followed by Financial and Insurance Activities at 13.4% and Administrative and Support Service Activities at 13.1%, indicating a robust demand in service-oriented industries. In contrast, primary sectors like Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing (1.2%) and industrial sectors such as Construction (0.78%) and Mining and Quarrying (0.09%) showed significantly lower hiring activity

Implication:

- **Jobseekers:** Should focus on opportunities in education, finance, and administrative roles where demand is highest.
- **Training Institutions:** Need to align curricula with the skills required for the thriving service sectors.
- **Policy Makers:** Should investigate policies to stimulate job creation in sectors with low recruitment, such as construction and agriculture, to diversify the labour market.

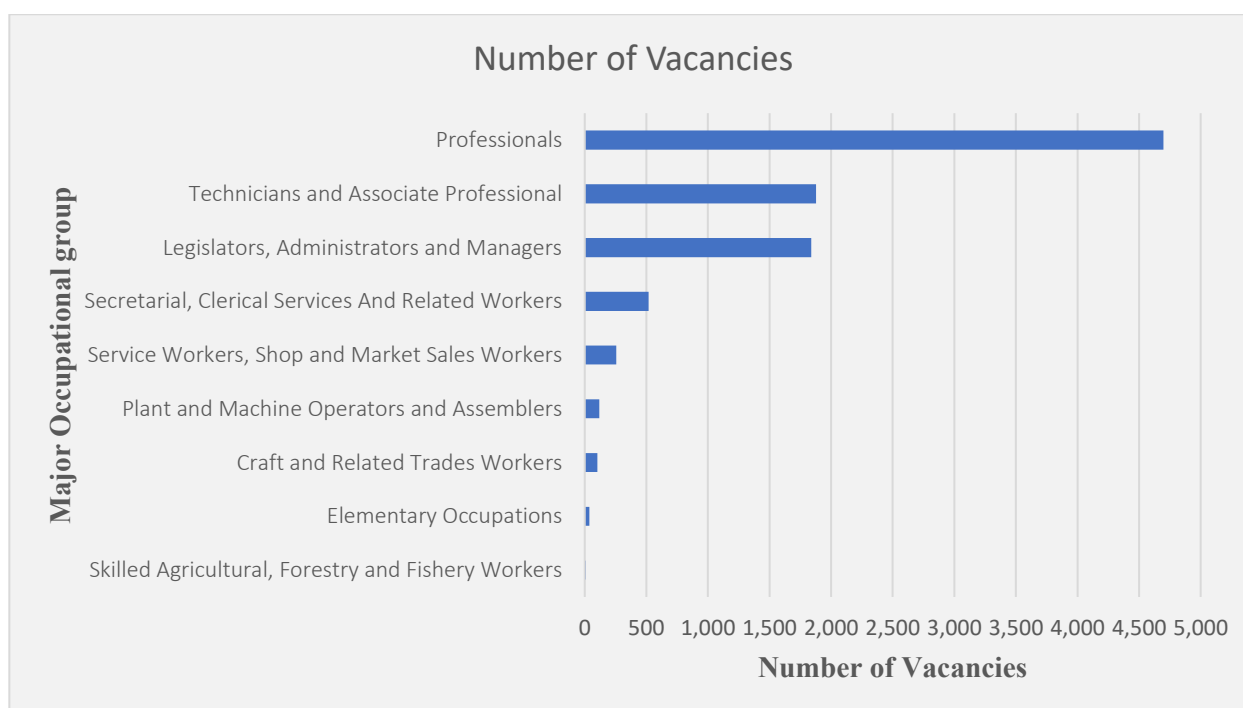


Figure 12: Job Vacancies by Major Occupational Group

Professionals constituted the largest share of job vacancies at nearly 50%, highlighting a strong demand for individuals with advanced expertise and qualification. Technicians and Associate Professionals (19.9%) and Legislators, Administrators, and Managers (19.5%) followed, underscoring the need for

technical skills and leadership. Conversely, roles requiring less specialized skills, such as Elementary Occupations (0.4%) and Skilled Agricultural, Forestry and Fishery Workers (0.1%), showed minimal demand, reinforcing the trend toward a knowledge-based workforce.

Implication:

- **Jobseekers:** Should aim for higher education and specialized training to access the largest segments of the job market.
- **Training Institutions:** Should focus on developing professional, technical, and managerial programs to meet this demand.
- **Policy Makers:** Should create pathways for upskilling workers in low-demand occupations to transition into more sought-after roles.

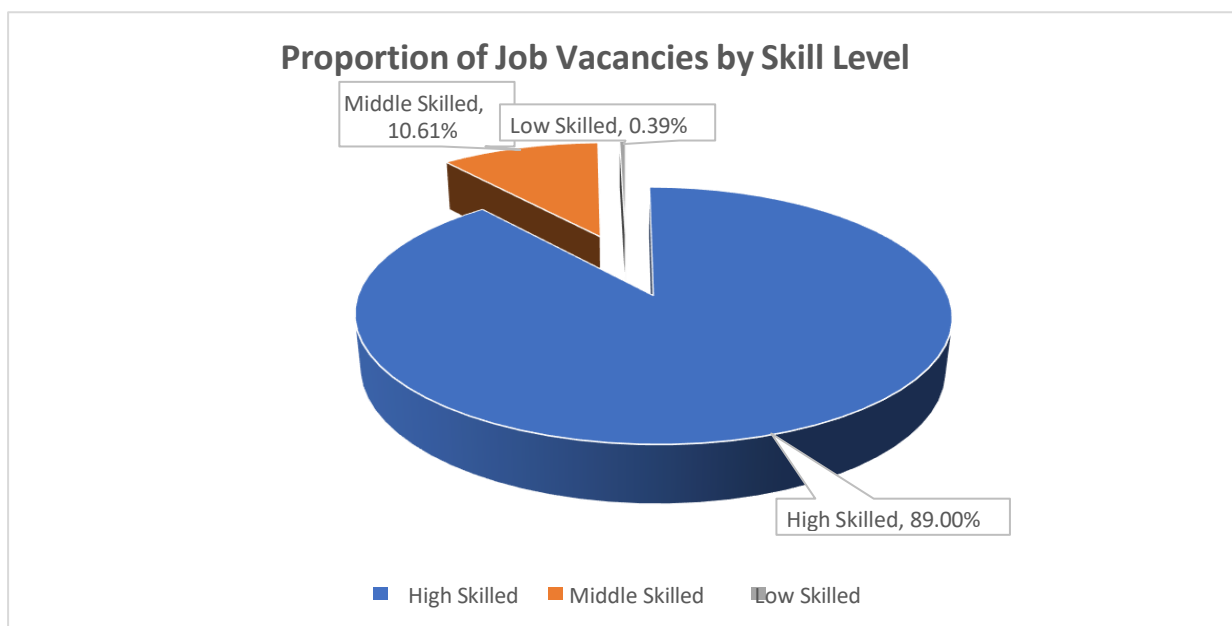


Figure 13: Proportion of Job Vacancies by Skill Level

The Kenyan labour market shows a distinct preference for highly skilled individuals, who accounted for 89% of all advertised vacancies. However, this high concentration of demand among professionals may widen existing skills gaps, especially where the education system has not fully aligned with employer needs. Expanding TVET capacity and integrating digital and leadership training could help bridge the mismatch between supply and demand.

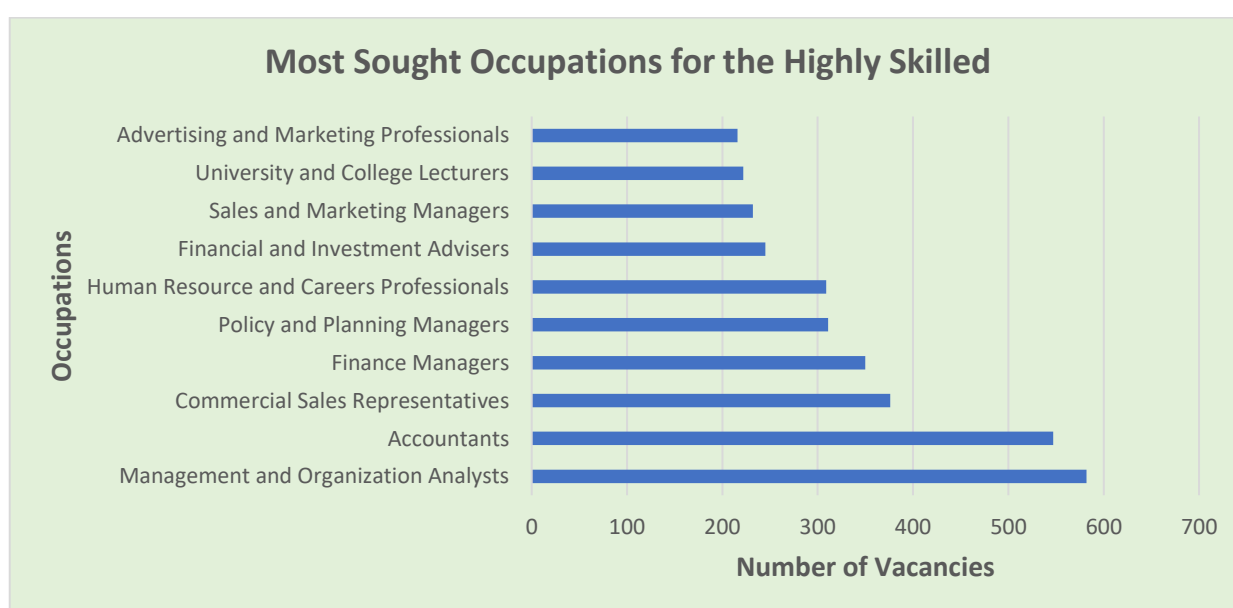


Figure 14: Most Sought Occupations for the Highly Skilled

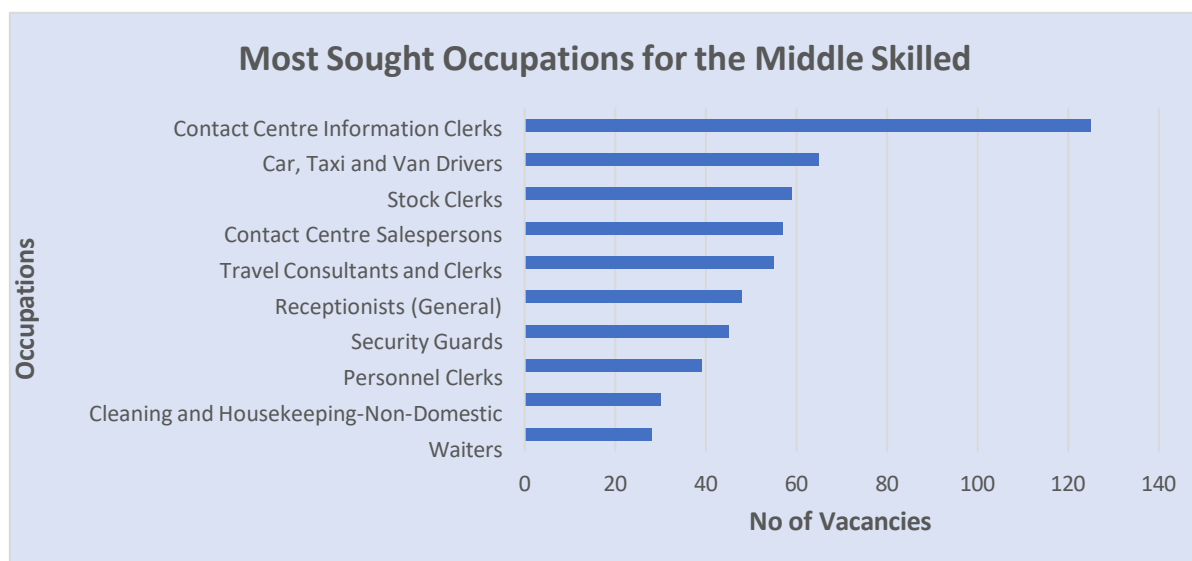


Figure 15: Most Sought Occupations for the Middle Skilled

Customer service and contact-centre roles dominated middle-skilled employment demand, with Contact Centre Information Clerks (125 vacancies) emerging as the most advertised occupation. Other highly sought-after roles included Car, Taxi and Van Drivers (65), Stock Clerks (59), and Travel Consultants and Clerks (55), reflecting the growing importance of logistics, communication, and administrative efficiency in an increasingly digitized economy. The continued demand for Receptionists, Personnel Clerks, and Security Guards further underscores the critical role of dependable middle-tier staff in ensuring smooth operations and quality service delivery across both public and private institutions.

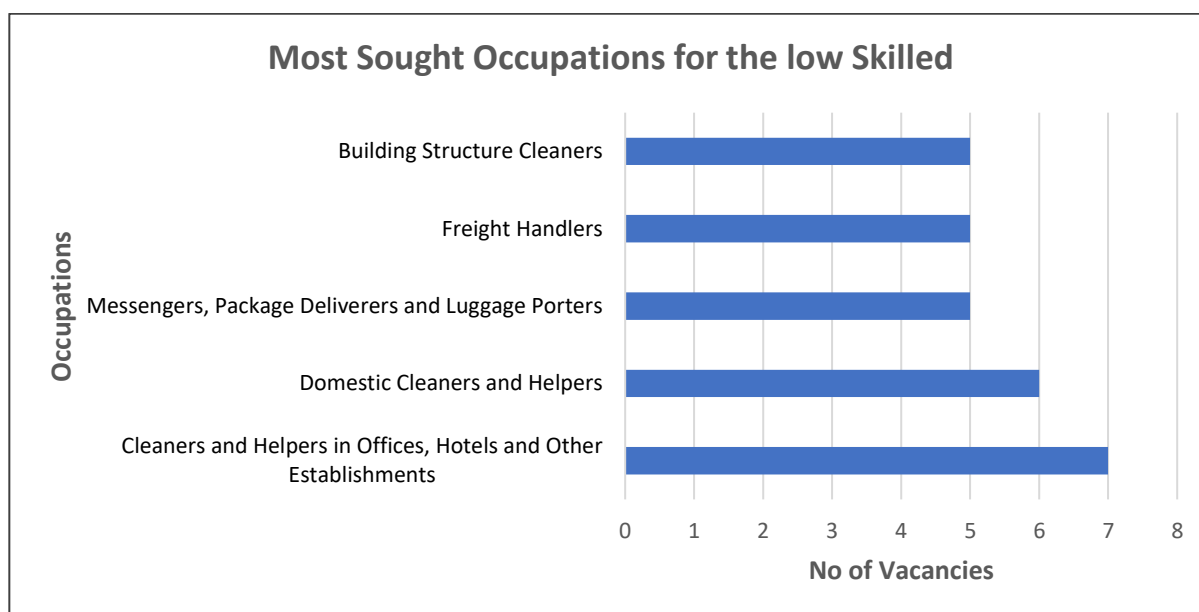


Figure 16: Most Sought Occupations for the low Skilled

Low-skilled occupations accounted for less than one percent of all advertised vacancies, indicating a sustained decline in demand for elementary roles. Most openings were concentrated in cleaning and manual service positions, with Cleaners and Helpers in Offices, Hotels and Other Establishments (7 vacancies), Domestic Cleaners and Helpers (6), and Messengers, Package Deliverers and Luggage Porters (5) featuring most prominently. Additional demand was observed for Freight Handlers and Building Structure Cleaners. The limited number of vacancies highlights the ongoing structural shift in labour market, where automation, outsourcing, and technology adoption are reducing reliance on low skill labour. This highlights the need for upskilling and short-term vocational training to enable low-skilled workers to transition into semi-skilled and service-oriented occupations with better job security.

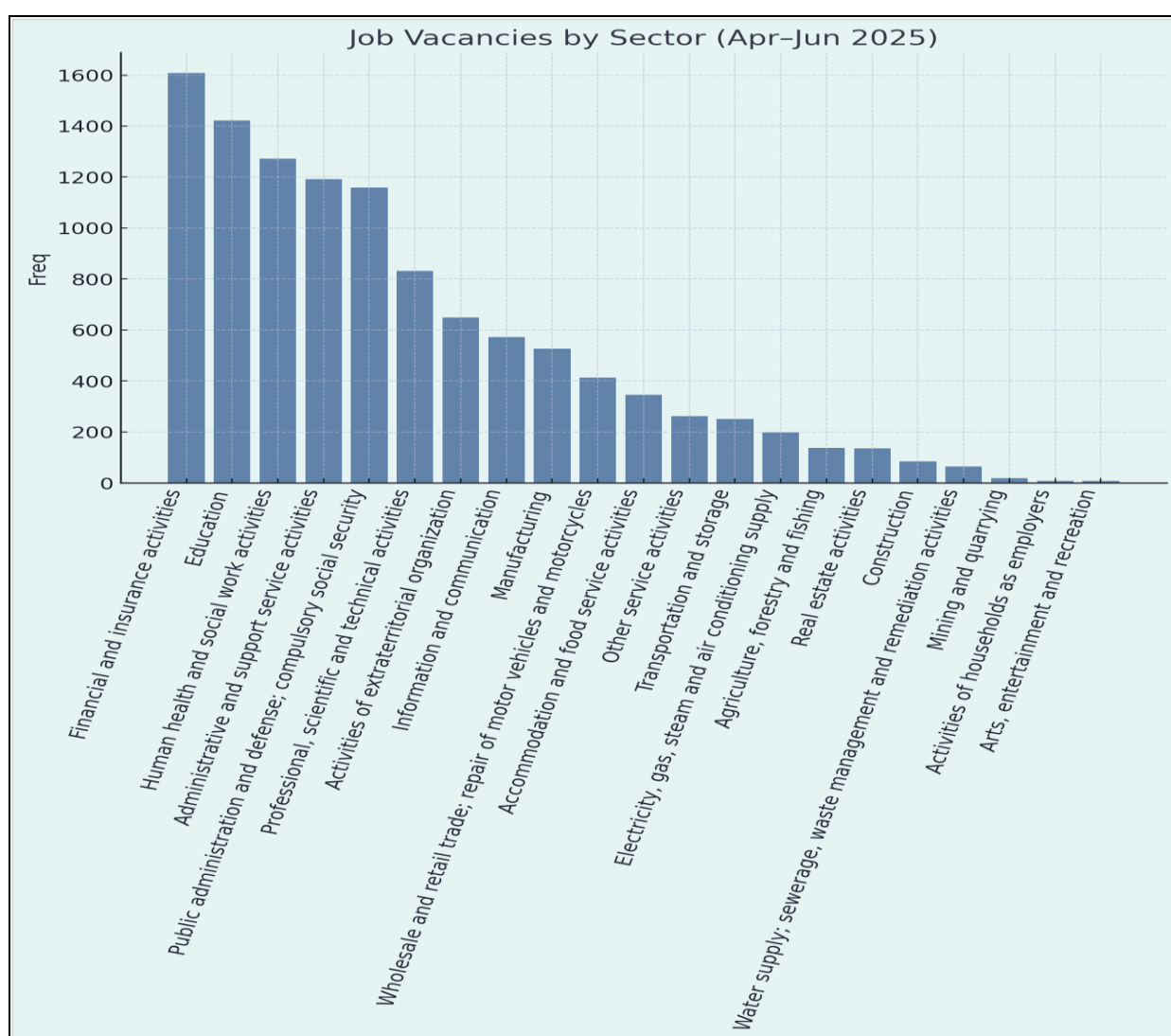


Figure 17: Job Vacancies by Sector

Vacancies in Financial and Insurance Activities led the quarter with 14.4% of total postings, followed closely by Education (12.8%) and Human Health and Social Work

Activities (11.4%). These three accounted for more than a third of all opportunities, highlighting sustained demand in knowledge-intensive and service-oriented sectors. Administrative and Support Services (10.7%) and Public Administration (10.4%) also featured prominently. In contrast, agriculture and construction contributed minimally, underscoring a structural tilt towards services.

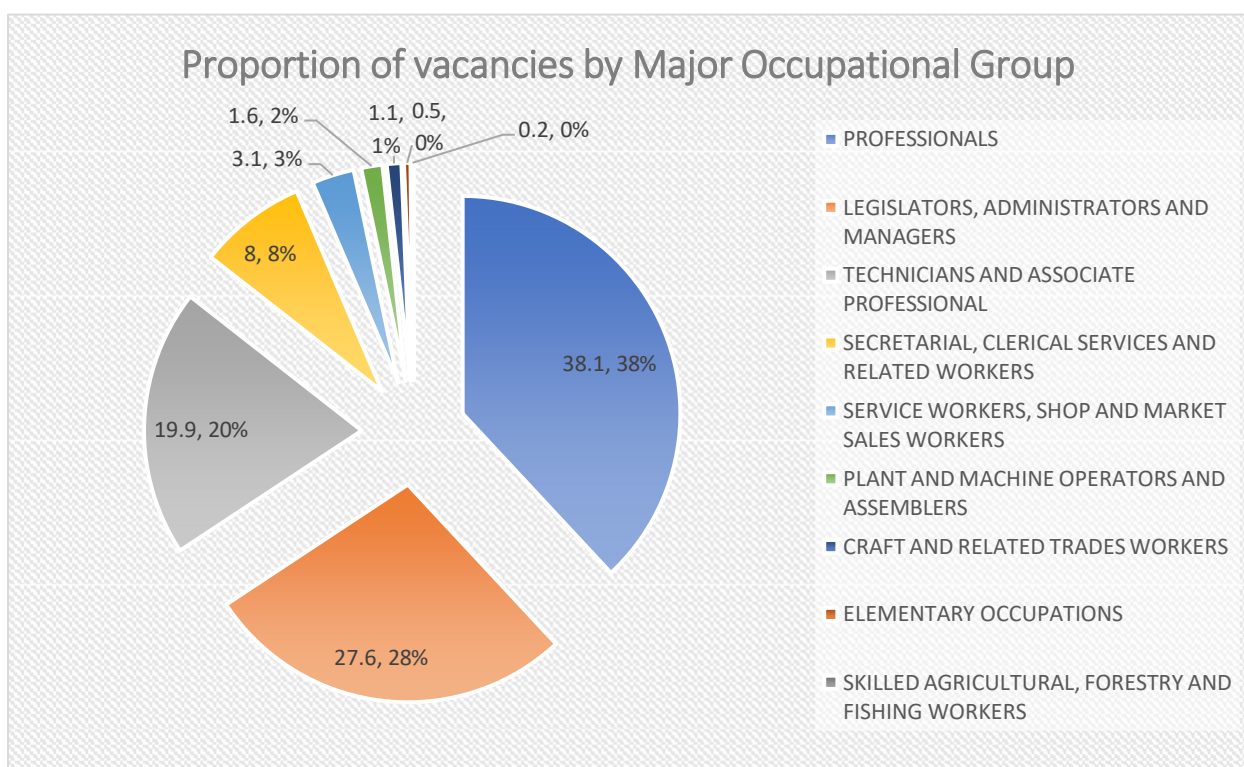


Figure 18: Job Vacancies by Major Occupational Group

Professionals dominated recruitment, accounting for 38.1% of advertised jobs. 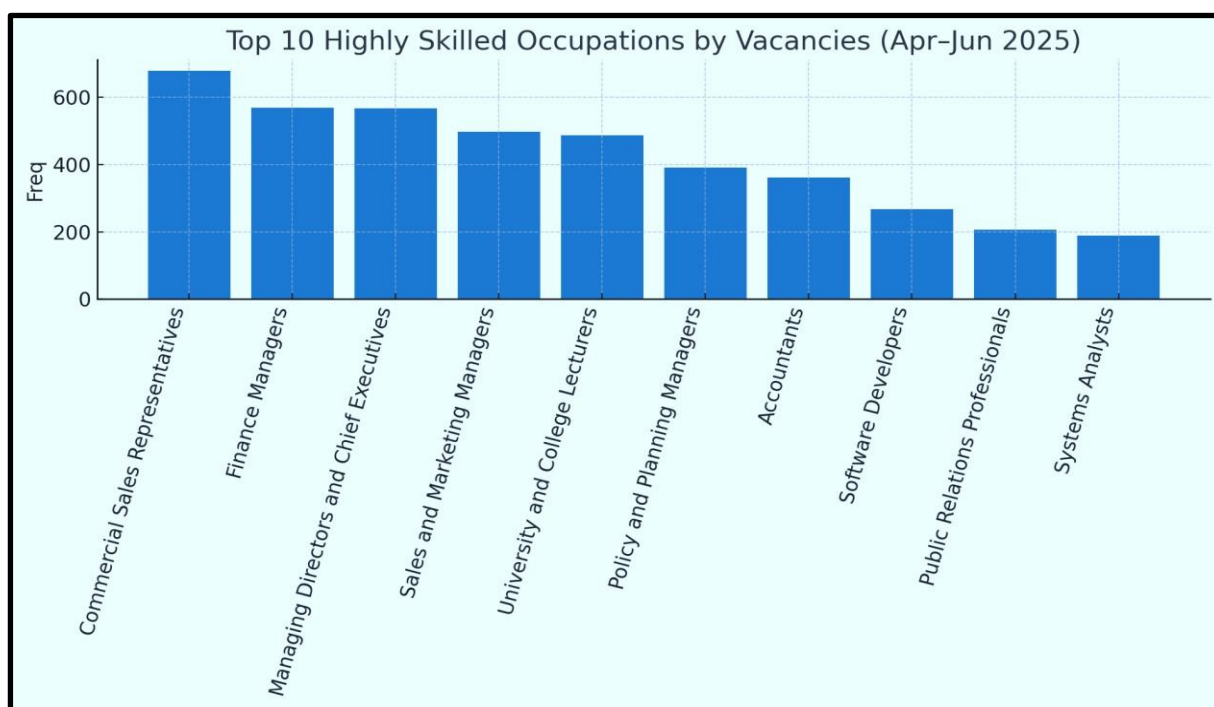


Figure 19: Top 10 Most Sought Occupations for Highly Skilled

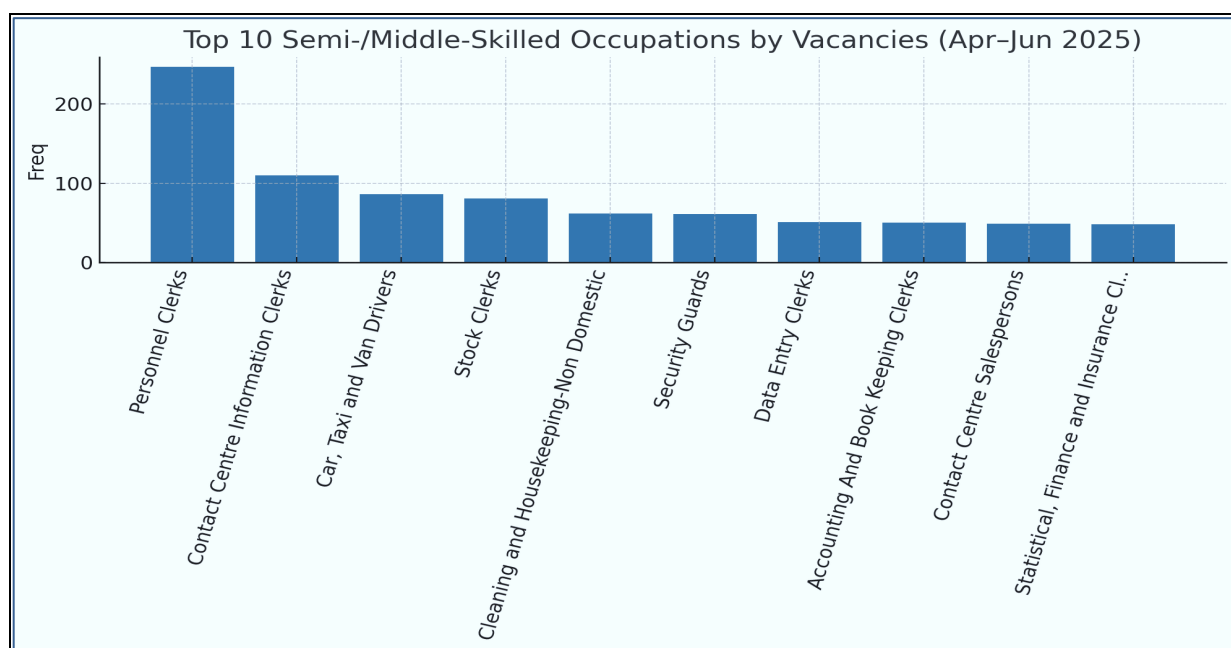


Figure 20: Top 10 Most Sought Occupations for Middle-Skilled

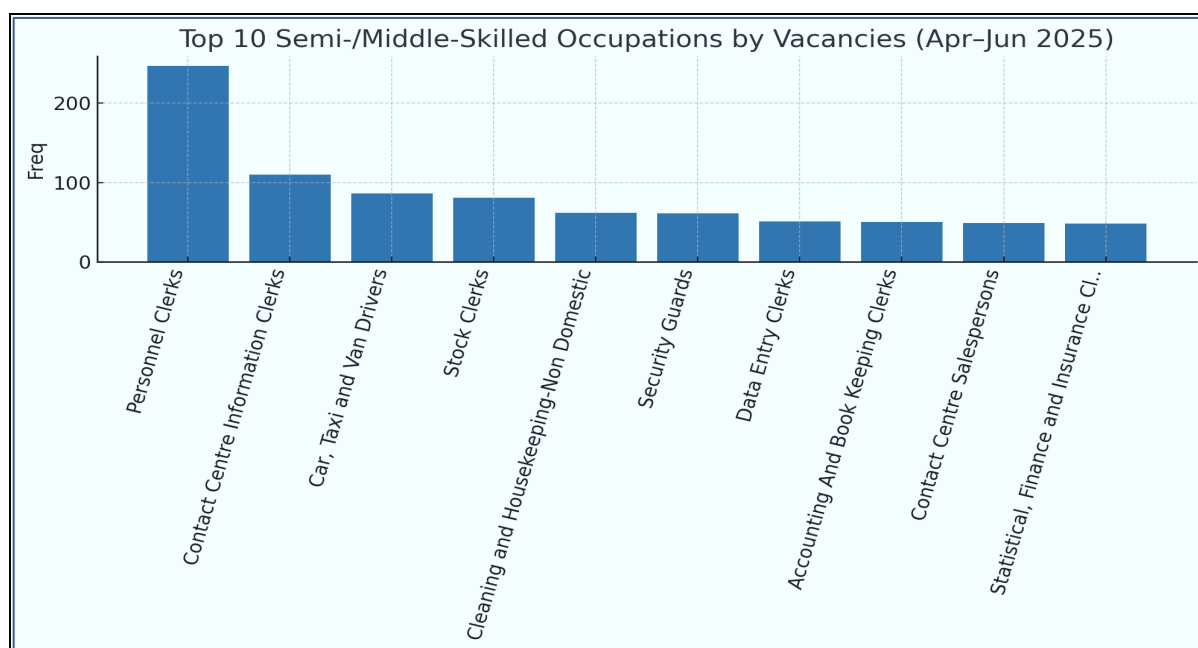


Figure 21: Top 10 Most Sought Occupations for Low-Skilled

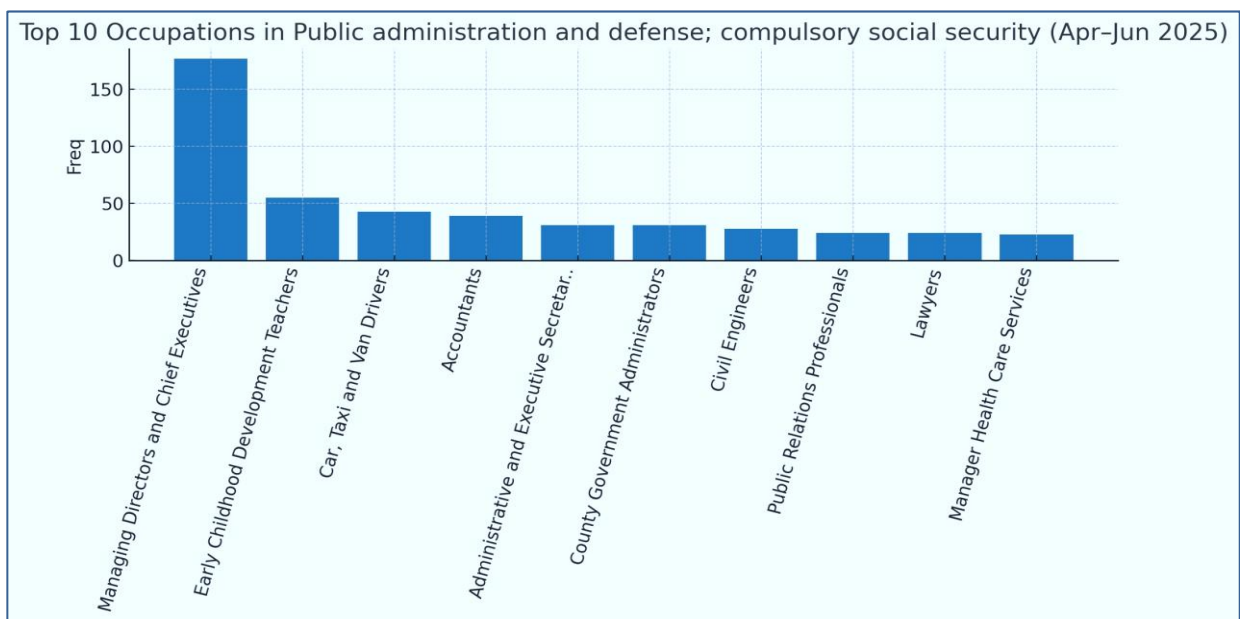


Figure 22: Top 10 Most Sought Occupations in Public Administration

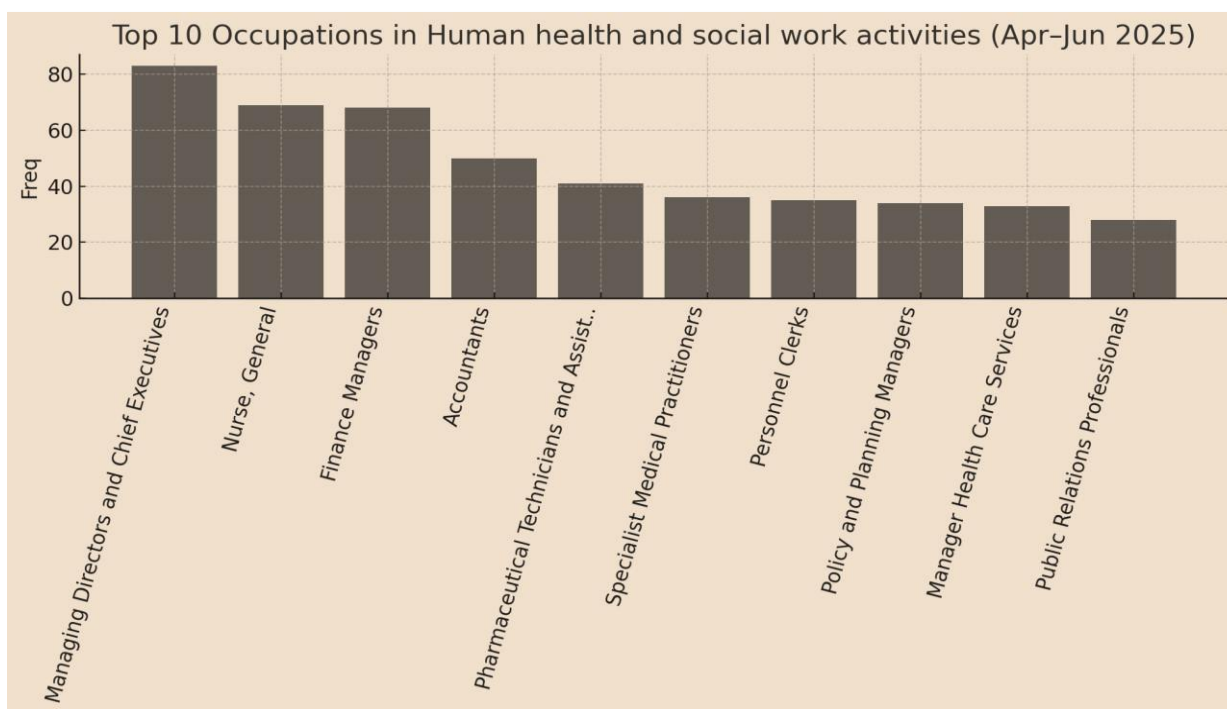


Figure 23: Top 10 Most Sought Occupations in Human health and social work activities

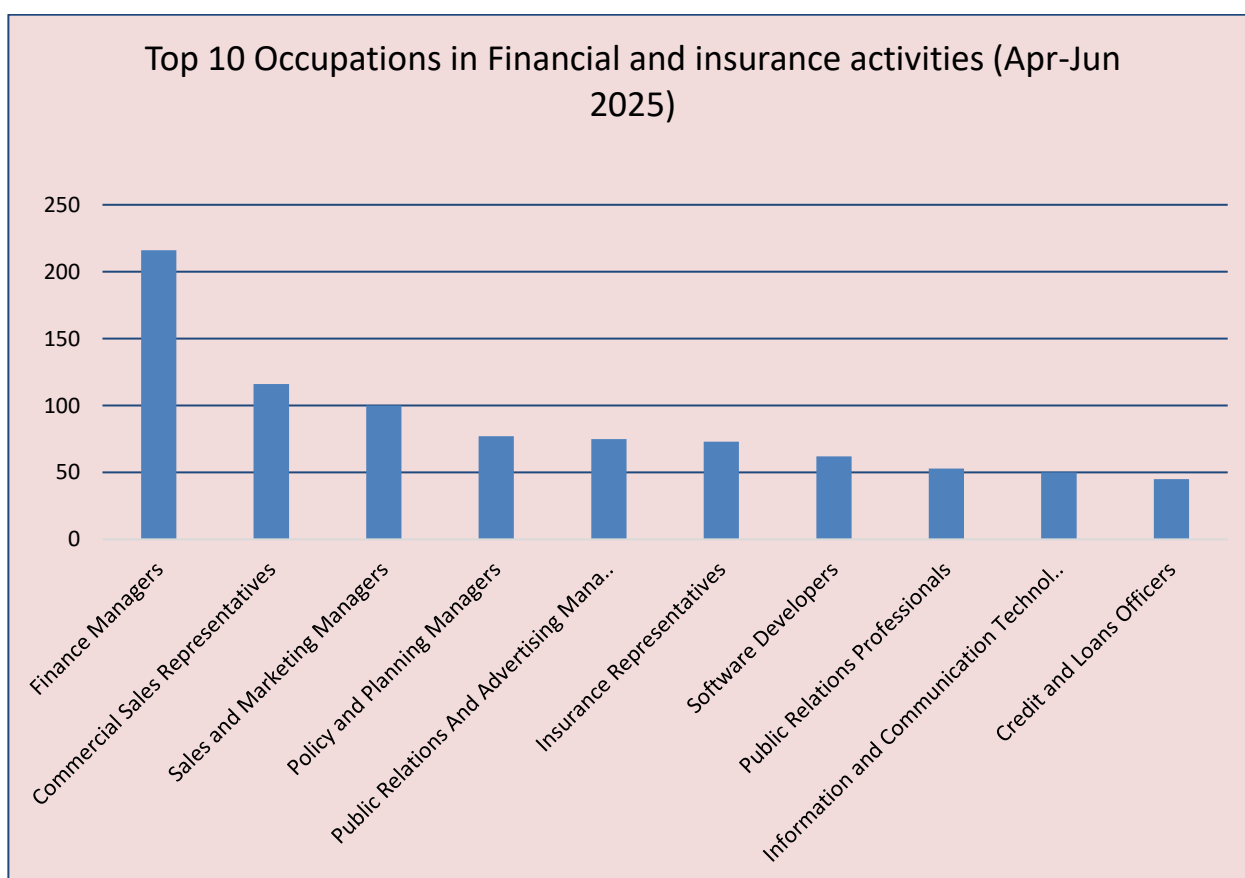


Figure 24: Top 10 Most Sought Occupations in Financial and Insurance Activities

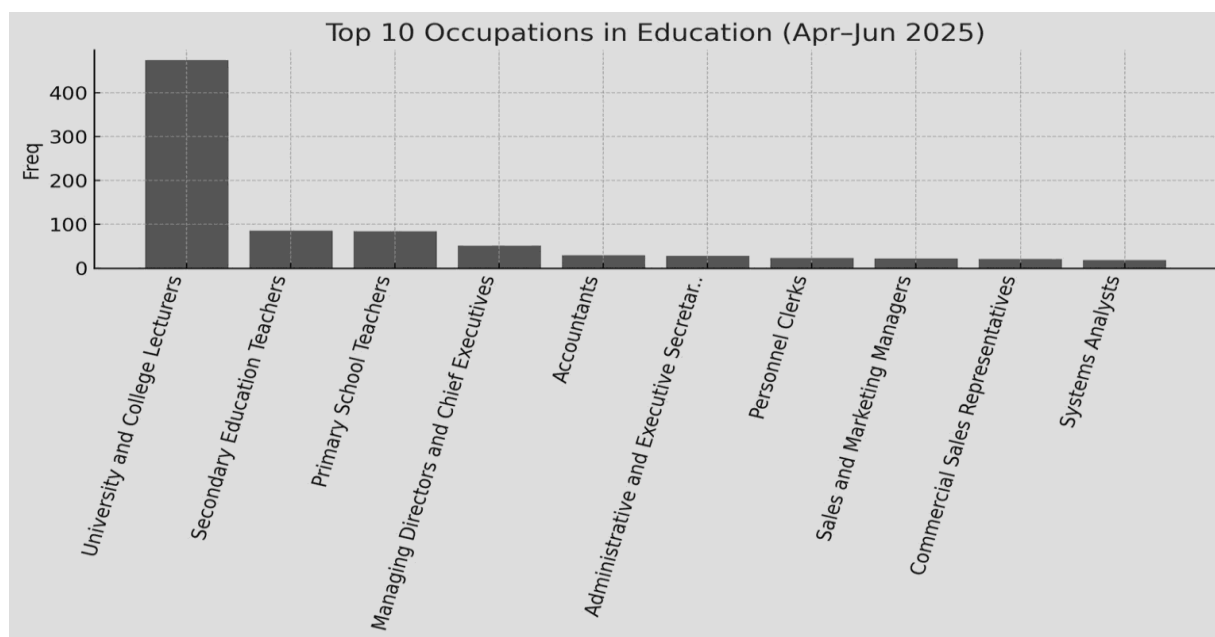


Figure 25: Top 10 Most Sought Occupations in Education sector

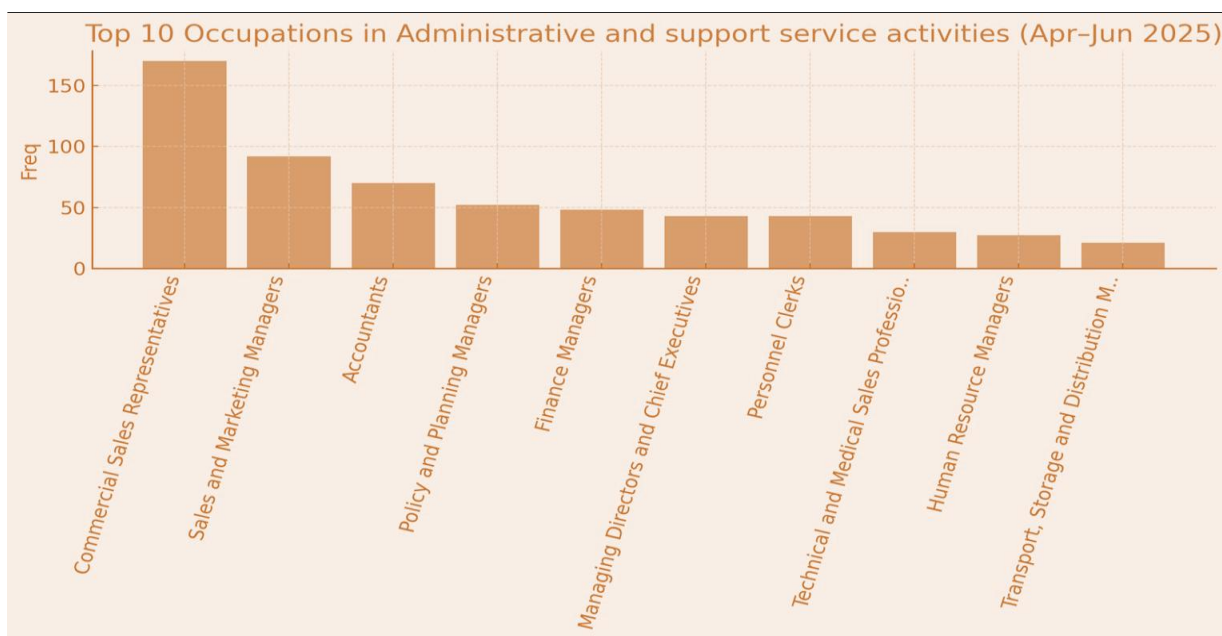


Figure 26: Top 10 Most Sought Occupations in Administrative and Support Service Activities
